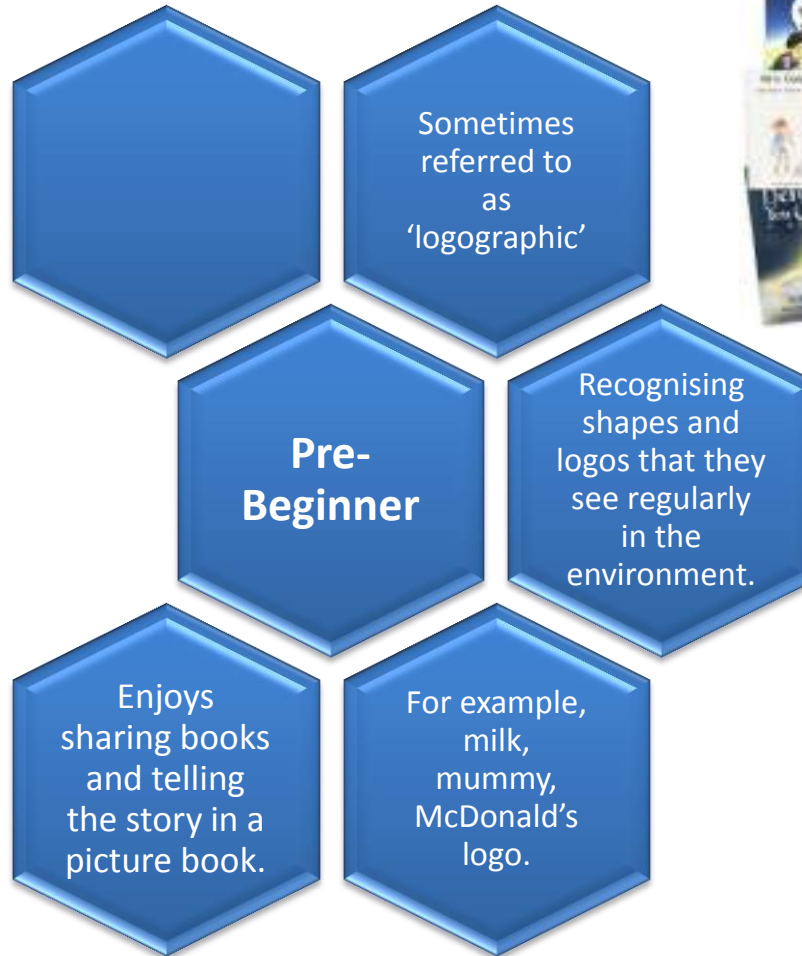

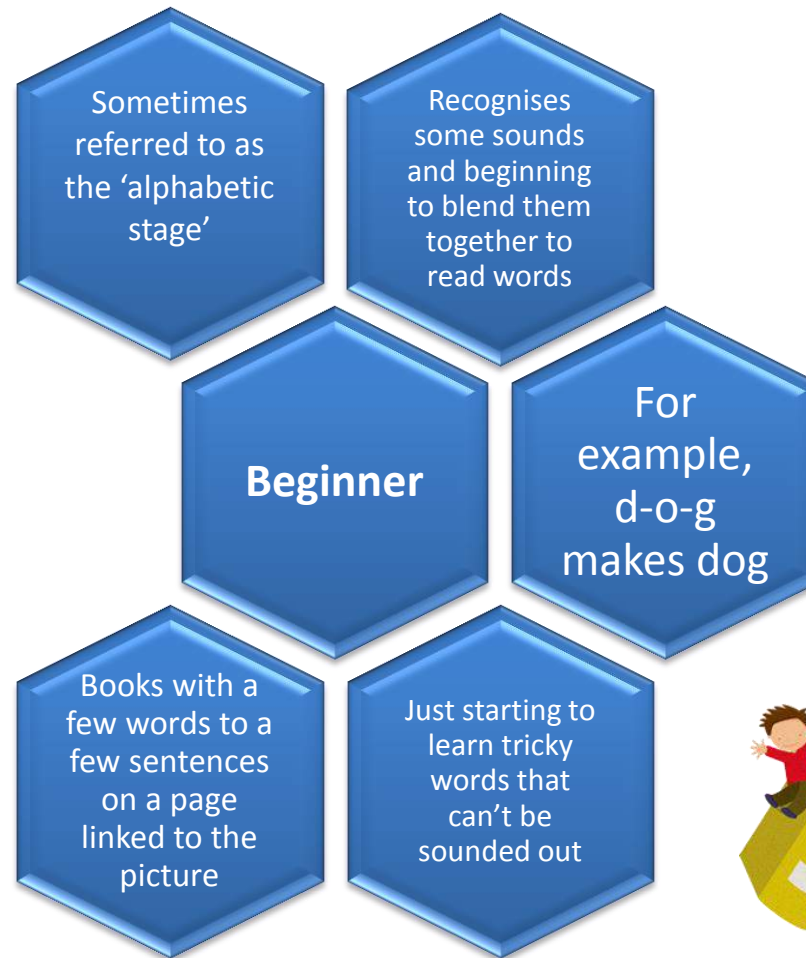

Chen, Liz and Raj are going on a picnic. "We must stick to the path. That says QUICKSAND," says Liz. Chen is singing to himself.

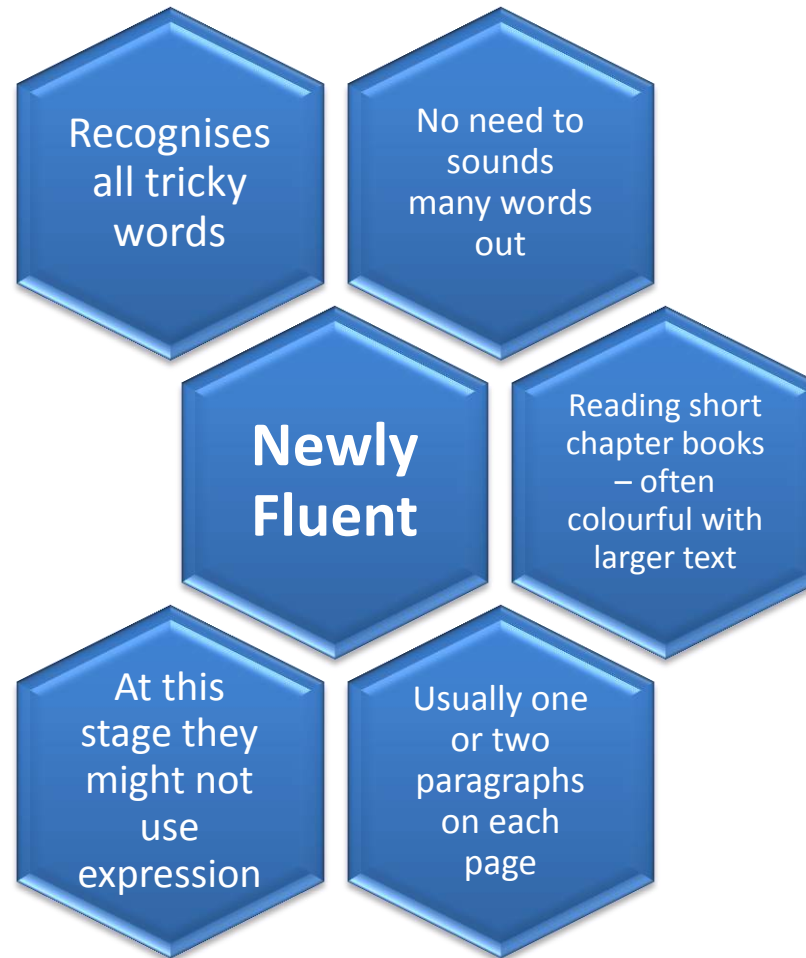
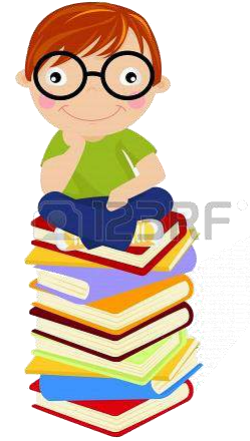

# Newly Fluent Reader

'Yes, and don't dawdle and don't daydream or I'll go up the wall. Mr Crab doesn't want these flans tomorrow. He wants them today.'

# The Reading Journey



Reads effortlessly at a good pace, instantly recognising most words and phrases on sight, even those with difficult spelling patterns

For example, the following words all contain the letter 'g': straight, regrettable, merge, tough.

## Confident reader

A fluent reader will instantly recognise the different sounds the 'g' represents and not attempt to sound out any every letter.

Reading more challenging chapter books – less colourful and smaller print.

Uses expression, consistently pausing for full stops and using character voices.



# Confident Reader

## \*Seven\*

Emily loved her bear. She gave me a big hug.  
"A bear hug!" she said. "Oh Daisy, she's so sweet. And look, she's got a daisy on her pinafore. I'll *call* her Daisy."

"I think teddies are stupid," said Chloe.  
"They're for *babies*."

Chloe gave Emily a special CD album of girl singers. She left the price on to show it was very expensive. Emily gave her a hug too. Emily gave everyone a hug. She was so happy she got very pink in the face. She matched Daisy Bear's fur.

Chloe suggested Emily play her new CD so we could all dance but Emily's mum said she'd sooner we didn't play music just at the moment as Emily's little brother Ben was having a nap, and there wasn't really space for us to dance, so perhaps we could all go out in the garden for half an hour while she got the picnic ready.

So we went into the garden with Emily's dad

# Practising Reading



Teachers teach reading strategies through 'guided reading' sessions each week and in the Infant school daily phonics sessions (EYFS begin guided reading later in the year).

Books are sent home for children to practise their reading. Children should be able to read these books fairly confidently – they should not be too challenging. They should be able to read approximately 90% of the book using taught strategies (phonics).

Teachers assess children regularly and decide when they are ready to change reading shelf.

# Crossways Home Reading Rewards



Children bring books home to read/share with their parents/carers/grandparents etc.



After reading, the adult (or child as they progress through the school)

- dates the reading record book
- writes a comment (if they choose)
- writes the current number of home reads in the margin



The adult must sign the reading record book









When the child has achieved 25 'home reads' they receive a certificate from Mr Toogood



Certificates are given for 'home reads' 25, 50, 75, 100 and so on!

# Recommended Reading

South Gloucestershire recommend that every child reads for

**10-15 minutes**

**5 times each week**

## **With a beginner reader...**

This could include:

- Your child saying the sounds in their book
- Your child reading to you
- You taking turns to read pages with your child

## **With a more confident reader...**

This could include:

- Your child reading to you
- Your child reading a book/chapter to themselves and you discussing it with them afterwards

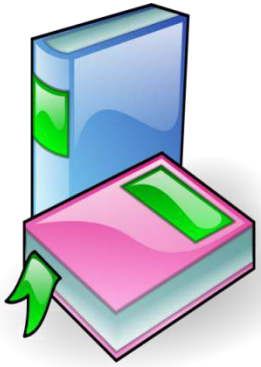
